Later in the week, the group toured a sugar plantation, observing the great poverty in which the workers' families of the plantation existed. And, near the end of the trip, they had a Vacation Bible School program that hosted over 650 people!

In February, **Trinity** held a Super Bowl Watching Party. A group of friends and church family "hung out" and enjoyed the game on two big screen TVs. Wonder if they all rooted for the same team. There was also the 19th annual Flag Football game in the afternoon.

In 2017, the Kingdom Krafters at **Massillon First** made and delivered 560 hats, 304 lap robes, 18 baby blankets and 200 dish cloths to Pregnancy Choices, Salvation Army, Faith in Action and nursing homes and chemo centers in the Massillon area.

The Children's Ministry Leadership Team at **Canton First** sponsored a special seminar called "Keeping Up with Kids Today" for all Children's

Ministry staff and volunteers. Parents, grandparents and friends were welcome to attend, too. The purpose was to learn the terminology and methods currently being used in providing assistance for special needs children.

The annual Chili Cook Off was held Saturday, February 24th at **Trinity**. Eight cooks volunteered to bring their favorite pot of chili. Participants included Shari Probst, Lisa Rodgers, Marcie Pots, Stefanie Spicer, Bill Kerr, Ellen Stauffer, Mark Stauffer and Steve Cope. 
Canton First held Wednesday Night Meal Fellowships in February. The meals were followed by adult Bible studies.

It was truly a blessing to know Dr. Jones as both a colleague and friend. I, along with the entire ABC/Ohio family, grieve this loss, and will pray for Denise and the entire Jones family in their grief. We pray for God's comfort and strength as they discover what lies ahead in their new chapter of life. Dr. Jones and Denise will always be a part of the ABC/Ohio family.

As I begin this ministry as your Interim Executive Minister, I want you to know that I do so knowing that the Region is in a season of transition, and my role as an Interim is to guide the Region through the transition as you seek God's direction towards calling a new Executive Minister. While the position of Interim Executive Minister is temporary, there are specific things that I plan to focus on.

First, and foremost, due to the nature of this transition, with the passing of Dr. Jones, I will provide leadership and pastoral care to the Region Staff, Board of Region Ministries, ABC/Ohio clergy, and congregations. The Region needs a time of God's grace to walk through the season of grief and experience God's healing. It will take time and include opportunities to express our grief and discover God's new direction for our life together. This pastoral care will receive my top attention.


My first three months call for two days per week. I

The second day will be a flexible day to accommodate the Region calendar and opportunities to connect with pastor's fellowship groups, and other gatherings. I also will be working with the Region Staff, Board, and Executive Committee to address the most pressing needs as the Region moves forward. I appreciate the confidence expressed by Rev. James Willis, Region President, and the ABC/Ohio Board in extending the call to be your Interim Executive Minister. I look forward to sharing ministry with the Region Staff, Rev. Jane Gibbons, Rev. Mark Click, and Mrs. Leslie Hoskinson. They have carried a heavy load the many months of Dr. Jones' illness. Together we will serve the Lord and the Region. We will walk by faith in serving Christ and you.

I close by asking that you covenant to pray for me, and this beloved Region in your prayers as ABC/Ohio is "Discovering God's Plan." Remember God's promise in Jeremiah 29:11, which says, "I know the plans I have for you declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Let us prayerfully discover the future together.

As I survey those counselors who have filled the roll of being "Life Changers," they all had only one thing in common. The Apostle Paul wrote to the Corinthian church that they should follow his example as he followed the example of Christ. To be an extraordinary

He carried a notebook and he talked to campers and he spent time listening to everyone. And then Fonty prayed and prayed and prayed. The moral of the story: Don't ever count yourself out. Fonty's example has encouraged me since I was a camper in high school and someday I hope to have the impact on another that Fonty had on so many others.

Spring Pastor's Column



"Be self-controlled and alert. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour." 1 Peter 5:8

When my parents took us to the zoo, they said, "Don't stick your fingers in the cages." When I took my children to the zoo, I said, "Don't stick your fingers in the cages." When my children take their children to the zoo, I'm sure they tell them the same thing. Wild animals may look pretty and "pettable", but they are unpredictable. That's why they are kept in cages. Still, some people ignore the warning signs and end up getting hurt.

I heard a story about a missionary in Africa on his way to a remote village, being guided by a native tribesman. When they stopped for the night and built a fire, they heard a lion softly roar. The guide asked, "How far away do you think that lion is?" The missionary said, "Maybe a mile?" The guide picked a burning stick from the fire and held it up to cast the light beyond the circle. There in the tall grass, about ten feet away, they saw two glowing yellow eyes! The lion had fooled them into thinking it was further away and less threatening than it really was.

The Apostle Paul addresses the issue of forgiveness in 2 Corinthians 2; he says in verse 11, "...in order that Satan might not outwit us. For we are not unaware of his schemes." As I think about our theme verse this month, it is clear that "prowling" and "roaring" don't fit together. To prowl effectively, you need to be quiet. So that story of the missionary and the lion seem to me to really fit this picture.

If the lion was running around roaring loudly, we would indeed hear it coming a mile away. But we are called to be self-controlled and alert, because if we let our guard down, we may miss the warning


signs. Paul also says, "Satan himself masquerades as an angel of light. It is not surprising, then, if his servants masquerade as servants of righteousness (2 Corinthians 11:14-15)."

For quite some time, the word "evil" was not considered to be politically correct. But it has made its way back into the conversation in describing mass shooters, pedophiles and drug dealers. No one starts out to be victims of any of those things, but a teenage boy withdraws from social contact, appears dark and moody, and we miss the warning signs that lead to a shooting rampage. A teenage girl strikes up an online friendship with a "peer" who turns out to be a sexual predator. Drug dealers never say, "Take this. It'll ruin your life." They say, "This will make you feel good, take away your pain and solve your problems."

When Satan, as a serpent, approached Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, Genesis 3:1 says, "Now the serpent was more crafty (KJV: "subtle") than any of the wild animals the Lord God had made." Temptation that is not attractive isn't really tempting, is it?

Paul also tells us, "Our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against ... the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms (Ephesians 6:12)." Whether or not you believe in a personal devil, temptations are real. Evil is real. We are alert to keep our children and grandchildren from approaching the lions in the pen; are we equally as alert to keep them, and ourselves, from approaching the lions on the prowl?
